MEMBERS SETTING THE STAGE FOR GEOPAY NEGOTIATIONS

TASK FORCE WORKING TO FIND SOLUTIONS TO THE HIGH COST OF LIVING

A group of six Local 1000 members —our GeoPay Task Force—met with the state on April 11 to continue preparing for geographic-based compensation negotiations that will take place when we bargain our next contract in 2020.

The Task Force is working with representatives from a half-dozen state agencies to find solutions to the high cost of living for our members. The topics include housing, transportation, child care, health care and comparable wages.

April's meeting focused on the pay differential between like classifications in state and federal employment. The Task Force discussed how CalHR determined comparable wages for private, local and federal positions that were aligned with similar state positions in their 2014 California State Employee Total Compensation Report and other methodology questions.

At the same time, our Task Force brought forward member stories from various regions throughout the state to show the human element of the lack of geographic compensation, including the negative impact on not only recruitment and retention but also the plight of loyal, dedicated state employees.

"We're using real-life stories to back up the facts we present," said Maisah Ali, a Senior Financial Institutions Examiner at the Department of Business Oversight in Los Angeles. "It's a powerful way for us to make progress at the bargaining table." In all, the Task Force—which began its work in October of last year—will hold a total of 12 meetings and will produce an in-depth report to be presented to the legislature.

"We can make real change on these deeplyfelt economic issues with more member participation," said Margarita Maldonado, our Vice President for Bargaining. "Let's stand together and show our power to win."
