National Day of Action ties raising the wage to racial and immigrant justice



On November 10, Local 1000 members joined the National Day of Action for \$15 and a Union, demonstrating our union's commitment to stopping the downward slide of wages that is destroying the middle class. Marches and rallies around California united state workers with other labor unions, community groups and low wage workers who are demanding that all work needs to pay the bills.

Highlighting the interconnectedness of low wages, racial injustice and unfair immigration policies in an address to the crowd gathered at the state capitol in Sacramento, Local 1000 President Yvonne R. Walker pointed out that economic injustice does not exist in a vacuum.

"We're going to stand together, not just for income inequality," said Walker, "but for the marginalized, the voiceless and the forgotten."

To honor our Purpose Statement's obligation to work toward economic and social justice for all Californians, Walker promised to continue to press for action on these issues at the city, county, state and national levels.
