LAPS GRADUATES BUILDING POWER FOR WORKERS



Our union is building power for workers by mentoring and training new stewards. On April 12, nine of our members completed six months of intensive training and graduated from our Leadership Apprentice for Stewards Program (LAPS).

Local 1000 stewards are members who have stepped up to be stronger leaders in our union. They amplify our voices and connect our members to build unity and strength across the state.

LAPS gives our stewards the tools they need to succeed. LAPS is a six-month program in which steward candidates take extensive online courses, interactive in-person trainings, and mentorship opportunities.

In just over two years, LAPS has added 250 certified union stewards to our ranks. Classes begin quarterly and, at any given time, three different groups of members are receiving training.

"Stewards are the foundation of our union," said Tamekia N. Robinson, Vice President for Organizing/Representation. "They are at the center of our Worksite Action Teams and on the front lines of engaging and empowering members to take action for a stronger union."

CONTRACT TRAINING HELPS STEWARDS **BUILD WORKPLACE POWER**



Our job stewards—more than 1000 strong—are working to learn the details of our new contract and how to use it as a tool to build member power.

"We're preparing for the challenges ahead—attacks on the rights and benefits we've worked so hard to achieve. We can only fight back when our members engage and stand together," said Dorrie Steadman, an RN working in San Diego and a member of the Unit 17 bargaining team.

Our stewards across the state are receiving comprehensive training about organizing their fellow members as well as the advances we made during bargaining and enforcing our contract rights. Our contract delivered on each of the four priorities identified by members: Increased compensation, better working conditions, greater opportunity for upward mobility and improvements in leaves and health and safety.

Our stewards will work with Worksite Action Teams to inform and engage our members to build the solidarity we need to enforce our rights and fight for social, economic and environmental justice.
